# Cross Network Critical Care AHP SIM Our Journey So Far

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# Project Overview

- Funding was obtained from a bid submitted to NHSE for 'upskilling in Intensive Care' for AHP's across North Central London
- The pilot project was to design and deliver a SIM course for speech and language therapists, occupational therapists, dietitians and physiotherapists who were new to working in critical care
- The funding secured was to provide 2 SIM days and offer 6 train the trainer courses to the network
- UCLH secured the bid but recognized that as it was a cross network, multi-professional project, collaboration was the key to making it a success

# Setting Up the Faculty



#### Team

- Expressions of interest were advertised via the NCL Critical Care AHP network quarterly meet
- We wanted representation from all the four professions and across the trusts
  - Breadth of experience
  - Covered all the educational needs

### Experience

- Minimal experience amongst AHP's in both running and attending SIM based learning
- Physiotherapists had the most
  experience as had run multiple SIM
  courses for on-call training
- Wealth of experience from Dan and Beth from the UCLH SIM suite

# What made me sign up?

# Setting The Scene

### **Building The Scenarios**

This was our challenge! ٠

- Collated all the perceived anxieties from new ٠ staff working in Critical Care from each profession
- Wanted to provide both the opportunity for ٠ practical skills and the complex communication skills required to work in high stress environment
- Relevant for all as each professional plays a very different role in Critical Care
- Decisions around whether we did professional specific scenarios or joint ones

### **Objectives**

Increase confidence working in the critical care environment

Reinforce knowledge through simulating common clinical situations



Understand interprofessional team working and communication



Review interprofessional and cognitive skills required to perform effectively

# Introducing Norman

**We decided to create the scenarios based on a patient pathway following their** journey from admission through critical care

 $\mathbf{P}$  This enabled us to create profession specific scenarios that would be relevant to everyone



PDependent on the scenario, Norman would either be an actor or mannequin

**P**This allowed for a solid introduction of the patient at the start of the SIM day and closely linked to MDT working within Critical Care

## Practice Run

- By now most of the faculty had attended train the trainer training
- We had only met over teams to develop and create our ideas
- A practice run was essential
- Iron out the detail
  - Meet each other properly!
  - Meet the technical team in the SIM Suite
  - Create an equipment list
- Have some invaluable debriefing training
- Created a pre and post course questionnaire

# What we did

- Advertised across the NCL Critical Care AHP network
  - Posters
  - Network meetings
  - Word of mouth
- Provided 2 full SIM days to a total of 24 delegates
- Gathered feedback from the first day to make improvements for the second day



# Invaluable Feedback - Were the scenarios Useful?

Yes. It was very good to observe different professionals and how they are involved in patient experience Yes - helpful to consider how to respond to different personality types / interactions with staff/patients/family members and how this might impact on your clinical sessions. Considering How you could deal with those kind of situations as part of the debrief

Considering How you could deal with those kind of situations as part of the debrief Observing scenarios of other members of the mdt was really helpful to understand the scope of their roles and different things you could get help from other mdt members with that might not be immediately obvious

# Invaluable Feedback - What have you taken away from today?

That critical care is very similar to other environments but with more alarms and not to panic! The value of the different expertise of everyone in the MDT. The importance of talking/debriefing after challenging situations.

Using the team around you - escalating as early as possible when the situation is beyond the scope of your practice/knowledge - using your non-verbal communication skills to diffuse a tense situation

Other people have anxiety around managing pts in critical care. Networking across NCL

Different roles of AHPs on ITU Ways to deal with stressful situations not to forget everyone is there to help, be supportive and work towards a common goal

# Invaluable Feedback - How could the course be improved?

Would be great to be able to do scenarios with other mdt members eg SLT, physio and nurse to mimic real life however understand with the av it's tricky

More exposure to the AHP profession being simulated - what are they doing, why etc. It would have been nice to have been able to participate in a SIM myself rather than just observe, however I still learnt a lot and took a lot from the day

A scenario involving multiple members of the MDT rather than profession specific

I acknowledge this is challenging with time constraints and funding for frequency of courses but everyone having the opportunity to do the sim scenario, could there be extra time for the sim or cap numbers at 2 of each professional ?

# Faculty Learning

- Creating partnerships across the NCL Critical Care Network to develop the future of the AHP workforce
- Faculty teamwork and collaboration was key to learn and develop the course
- Emotional impact of the acuity of the scenarios for the observers
- Learning more about simulation-based learning and the value of safe, effective debriefing has enabled a transfer of skills into both clinical and supervisory roles
- Impact of having AHP roles acknowledged and recognised within a simulation-based environment

# Where did we go from here?

- We all believed it was a huge success
- But...time and money required to provide this course again
- Project was presented at the NCL Network Education Event in 2023
- Successful bid for further funding to run another two SIM courses in 2024, highlighting the importance of investment into AHP education
- Regrouped and identified the need for new faculty members to support the fluid nature of AHP's rotating through Critical Care
- Took the invaluable feedback from both the faculty members and delegates to design and create a new improved AHP SIM course that is being run in April/May 2024

## AHP SIM 2024



Recruited some new members to the faculty



Reduced delegate list down to 10 to allow everyone to participate in a SIM scenario



Introduced a multi-disciplinary meeting scenario to include all professionals



Designed a brand-new course for advanced skills in ICU for AHP's with some experience in Critical
